## A Few Words about Courtney Rowe

I'd like to say a few words about my Dad, Courtney Rowe. A few words is appropriate because he was a man of "Few Words". The few words that I have chosen are:

- A Humble and Kind Man
- Family Focused
- An Exceptional Engineer
- His favorite hobby was Steam & Steam Engines

My Dad had a very dry sense of humour, and he didn't like long winded speeches. I think he'd give me a wry smile if I finished the speech here. But I think you deserve a few more words than that.

So let's start with Family Focused: Born in Kuggar in 1930 at Kuggar Farm to Will & Louisa. His sister, my Aunty Pat has been a protective older sister ever since for the past 88 years. My Dad was adventurous from a young age. One afternoon when Dad was only 2 years old, he decided he wanted to visit his grandmother, so without telling anyone, he set out through the orchard, over the stile, across the field, and over to his grandmother's shop in Kuggar, where he announced "I cummed over by myself!".

Courtney went to Ruan Minor School. His teacher Miss Pascoe wrote in her memoir:

Courtney settles any argument,

For he is bright with thoughtful mind

Others listen to his theory,

And all agree he's fair and kind

Courtney met Gill Mitchell at an early age. They shared the bus to Helston School. I

hear he helped her with her Maths homework. And for the Americans here today that's Math homework. There is a story that shortly after the war when fireworks were in short supply, Courtney was able to get Gill some fireworks from his Grandmother's store. The exchange was made on the school bus. I don't know what the rules were about bringing fireworks to school at the time, but I know it wouldn't be allowed today.

After Courtney left school, he went to Malvern to do an apprenticeship, where he learned metalworking and how to use a lathe. He won a state scholarship to Bristol University to study Physics. He graduated with 1<sup>st</sup> class honours. He did his National Service by working for the Aerospace Industry.

He asked Gill Mitchell to marry him in January 1956, on the banks of the River Thames in London. They were married in this chapel on 6th October 1956. They were married for 62 years. His first son Robert was born in 1959. I was born in 1961. He has 5 grandchildren. Courtney, Morwenna & Oliver (Robert's Kids) and Jenny & Michael (my kids). He has 2 great-grandchildren; Ben and Thomas.

As I said in the introduction, Courtney was a Great Engineer. The bulk of his career was spent at Bristol for the British Aircraft Corporation, which became British Aerospace. In the 60's he worked on the Concorde, he worked on the Avionics Electronics. The biggest project of his life was Project Manager for the Intelsat IV Communications Satellite. It was a technical marvel, an order of magnitude bigger than heritage satellites. The constellation provided entire world coverage. Over its lifetime Intelsat IV has carried billions of phone calls and millions of TV programs, including live coverage of Olympics and World Cups. Much of the communications went through the local Goonhilly Ground Station. It is interesting that "A Man of Few Words" should have done so much for Worldwide Communications.

Intelsat IV was a highly successful program, and it was a year or so later, that Courtney received a letter from the Prime Minister, Harold Wilson, letting him know that he had been awarded the MBE with an invitation to Buckingham Palace to personally receive the award from the Queen.

The successful engineer was just one side of my Dad. He was humble and kind throughout his life. He would do anything for anybody, whether he was volunteering at the Chapel as Church Treasurer, Youth Club Volunteer, Odd-Job Man, or volunteering at the Marconi Hut. His knack for fixing things was well known. A long line of broken electronics was brought to Courtney to try to fix. Most but not all were fixed. Joan Williams' VCR stopped working when a rotten pear dripped into it. He fixed it and was rewarded with some choice fish.

His favourite hobby was Steam Engines. In his retirement he built 2 good sized Traction Engines. One  $\frac{1}{4}$  scale and another  $\frac{1}{5}$ th scale. They were fully functional. He did all the machining and metalworking himself, and demonstrated great crafts-

manship. He loved his time in his Workshop in the Garden. Courtney was a member of the "Greasy Gang". Every Friday, this auspicious group travelled to the Levant Mine on the North Cornish Coast, to rebuild the beam engine there. They rebuilt it and got it running. It is now a popular National Trust Exhibit. Courtney loved the Trevithick Society and their work with Industrial Archaeology. Courtney loved playing cards and was a member of the Bridge Club.

Courtney even wrote a few books: A couple on the Levant Beam Engine. The History of the Lizard Lifeboat. And his best seller! "Marconi at the Lizard", which is available on Amazon. I think you will agree that Courtney Rowe led a full life.

I was at home in South Carolina when Mum called to say Dad was going downhill. I booked to fly home the next day, June 20th. Unfortunately Dad passed away that next morning, so it was with a heavy heart that I went to the airport that evening. The weather was hot and humid, and we had a thunderstorm, which are very common in South Carolina. As I was getting ready to board my flight, the rain stopped and a huge vibrant rainbow appeared. It was the first rainbow that I have seen in years, it was very bright, with a full arc. In fact, the most brilliant rainbow that I have ever seen. The message I took from the rainbow was that my Dad had just been welcomed into heaven.

I'll leave you with that positive message. Thank you for all coming to show your love and support for Courtney Rowe. And one last thing, I'd like to thank Courtney Rowe for being "My Dad".

#### HOLIDAY LETS IMPORTANT NEWS

#### From Grade Ruan Parish Council

If you own a property anywhere in Cornwall that you let to holiday visitors then any waste that your visitors generate will not be included in the routine waste collection system. Cornwall Council are now taking a tougher line on this as the waste generated by properties that provide self-catering accommodation is classified as commercial waste, regardless of whether a property pays Council tax or Business rates. It is your responsibility to arrange a contract with a private waste collection company. If, for any reason, you are unable to do so, then you should contact Cornwall Council by phone or email requesting that the Council's contractor (currently Biffa) would collect the waste using the same vehicles that currently collect all domestic waste. There will, of course, be a charge for this service.

#### Text of email message from Cornwall Council:

After the introduction of the Controlled Waste Regulations in 2012 any waste generated by paying customers in self-catering accommodation (regardless of the rating of the property) was classed as commercial, and therefore fell outside the scope of what Local Authorities were required to collect. In Cornwall, the Council is now taking action to remove any commercial waste generated through self-catering business activities from the domestic waste stream as it is only fair that business owners should not be being subsidised by the taxpayer to have their waste collected by the Council.

At the same time the Council does recognise that for many self-catering owners, finding a commercial collection contract can be very difficult. Though the Council does not run a commercial waste collection service at this time, our Collection Contractor, Biffa, have agreed to work with us to cover any gaps in commercial collection coverage that arise. Self-catering property owners can contact the Council (by phone or email) to request that their commercial waste be collected by the same vehicles that currently collect their domestic waste if they are unable to find a commercial contractor to do this. This is to be treated as a last resort however and we would encourage all self catering owners to seek contracts with private companies before turning to the Council.

Biffa have provided us with some indicative costs for this service based on a weekly collection Monday to Friday however these will vary depending on the circumstances of each property. These are:

Commercial waste sacks: £3.50 each.

• 240 litre bin: £8 per week.

• 360 litre bin: £10 per week.

Please feel free to communicate this to any owners of self-catering properties that enquire regarding this.

## Mark and Julie Oldfield Volunteer with the Soi Dog Foundation

Mark and Julie Oldfield from Cadgwith have just returned from Phuket in Thailand working with the Soi Dog Foundation, The word 'soi' is Thai for 'alley' or 'street' and the Charity supports animals at risk of slaughter as part of the dog meat trade. Mark and Julie have been volunteering for the last four years helping to care for the rescue dogs in Phuket.

The Soi Dog website shows that 16,121 dogs have been rescued from the dog meat trade, 324,501 animals have been sterilised and vaccinated and 7,899 sick and injured animals were treated last year. The good news is that many animals go on to be adopted, not just in Thailand but all round the world. 820 dogs and cats were adopted last year, The main aim of the Foundation has been to control the dog population and as a result Phuket's stray dog population has reduced from about 80,000 to approx 7,000.

While in Thailand Mark and Julie helped the Charity to rescue strays off the street, many of them with horrific injuries and diseases. However they also get to walk and socialise with the dogs and get huge satisfaction in knowing that they have been able to make a difference to the animals' lives.

It is amazing that in this small community we have a couple who are prepared to go thousands of miles to help these vulnerable animals. This is such a worthy cause but it takes fortitude and great dedication to be prepared to do something which whilst so rewarding must also be heartbreaking. Julie and Mark are an example to us all.

# LIZARD LIFEBOAT VISITOR CENTRE NEWS

A new chapter in the history of the Lizard opened in June 1961 when the Lizard Lifeboat moved to a new station in Kilcobben Cove. The launch and recovery operations at Polpeor were fraught with difficulty and the need for a larger and more efficient lifeboat could not be fulfilled there. After much assessment, research and deliberation, plans for a new station at Kilcobben Cove were announced in July 1958. The chosen location was uniquely situated to provide shelter from the prevailing south westerly winds and give an ample depth of water for the boat to work in whatever the state of the tide. Construction work began in the summer of 1959 and the new station became operational in June 1961 with the official opening by HRH The Duke of Edinburgh taking place on 7<sup>th</sup> July 1961.

With a new station came a new boat, *RNLB THE DUKE OF CORNWALL*. The new Lizard Lifeboat was a MKII 52ft Barnett Class boat with a crew of 6, an operational speed of 9<sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> knots and a working range of 300 nautical miles. A 'state of the art' boat at that time, *RNLB THE DUKE OF CORNWALL* was just a little slower than our current Tamar Class boat *RNLB ROSE* which has a standard operational speed of 25 knots and a working range of 250 nautical miles.





A NEW STATION READY FOR ACTION

THE NEW BOAT IN ACTION

The first major service launch for the new boat began at 02.36 on Sunday, 15<sup>th</sup> April 1962 when, in thick fog, she was tasked to assist the Falmouth based yacht 'Gweneth' which had lost engine power through a fouled propeller and

severely restricted visibility the 'Gweneth's' crew had lost their bearings but *THE DUKE OF CORNWALL* took her in tow and helped her to safe anchorage near the new station slipway.

After a few minor shouts, the year ended in a tragic manner which tested the coxswain, crews and new boat to the full. At 20.50 on Saturday, 29<sup>th</sup> December 1962, they were tasked to search for a Dutch coaster which was reported as capsized and sinking three miles west of the Lizard in atrocious weather conditions. *THE DUKE OF CORNWALL* launched into the full face of a Force 10 gale with snow and sleet making conditions even worse. Five other vessels were involved in the search but four of these were forced to run for shelter against the onslaught of the storm. The Lizard Lifeboat and her crew scoured the water for 14 hours before having to put in at Falmouth having neither seen nor found anything of the reported coaster.

It later became evident that the missing vessel was, in fact, the British motor coaster 'MV Ardgarry' which was en route from Swansea to Rouen with a cargo of anthracite coal. The 'Ardgarry' was not found and all 12 hands were lost in the tragedy. Two of her boats were washed up badly damaged, one near Sennen and one on St Martin's Island, Isles of Scilly.

During these years he met and befriended a lady called Hazel Osborne, who was also a keen motor sport enthusiast. It was discovered she was Jean's god daughter and had elocution lessons with Jean. What a small world, I still have the wedding present she gave us.

While reading the diaries names come up from the past. I don't suppose there are many people living in the area now who will remember names like Admiral King, Mr and Mrs Mirehouse, Miss Neasham and her niece Sylvia, Miss Lester, Foster Noye and Gerald Bernard Squibb, Bevil Stephens and many more. Others mentioned are well remembered..... Henry and Mrs Pollard, Belman Bray, Nina and Jill Coltart at Lipstick Cottage, Mrs Cohen and Nita. Mrs Hunt is mentioned and although I remember her vaguely I just cannot think where she lived.

Archie Stephens worked for Mr Ironside until 1952 and Jean would go fishing in the rowing boat with him at Carleon an also rock fishing off Enys Head, as well as going to the Lizard Lifeboat Station to dig for lug worms. Who remembers The Flag Staff? She mentions walking up to it on occasions. I remember it well as my youngest sister, Rosemary, took her first steps there. Another place she mentions with regard to her many walks is Bray's Cott. This was a mystery to me and then a couple of days ago I had a flash of inspiration. I remember my Dad mentioning it and believe that at one time there was a small dwelling at the junction of Gwendreath Road with the Goonhilly Road.

My query about Monty in my last article has been resolved. It was Monty Stevens who lived at The Lizard when he married Elsie. Jean mentions calling on Monty and Mrs Monty and Archie and Mrs Archie (a quaint way of writing about her visits). She also had a quaint saying that I find amusing, when she had a stomach ache she would say she had a pain under her pinny! Another amusing comment was with regards to a journey overnight on the train from London, saying, "I had a good trip and so I should have paid 24/s for the sleeper."

Jean remained a very busy person after the war and taught at Overstone School in Northampton two days each week. She also taught at other schools and colleges for a short time each week. She had rooms in Market Street, Leicester, and took private lessons there in elocution, drama, mime and phonetics. Her writings make me feel very lazy as she was always dashing from one lesson to another and was heavily

involved with the theatre in Leicester. She helped produce some plays and acted in others and was on the committee of the production side.

When on holiday at Poltesco, always called 'home', she continued to support various village activities. In 1949 she mentions attending the Cadgwith Regatta which was held for the first time since the war. Also around that time she went to watch the Cadgwith Lifeboat being launched and went out on it! Four years later she again managed a ride. Also of interest, that she attended in order to help, was the British Legion children's party. She says 100 children were present. She often helped at the Church Fete at the Rectory and other fund raising events. (I personally recall one Church Fete as I was given the task of presenting a bouquet to Mrs Harper). Jean also went from door to door in 1952 selling flags for the RNLI.

I hope Grade Ruan Gazette readers are interested in these snippets of information from years gone by. I am finding the diaries fascinating in respect of how people lived in those days. Rationing was still with us in 1953 and queueing for food was still the norm. Every day she had tea during the afternoon and then supper as a main meal of the day about 7 or 8 pm. Because of rationing there were a lot of meals that comprised eggs so they did not get their five a day on a regular basis. However, there were occasions when a good meal of duck of pheasant is mentioned.

In 1953 Jean sold her car for £100, the price she had paid when she bought it 14 years before! She bought a brand new Ford Anglia. She continued with her hobby of maintaining her car, although needed help from various garages when things went really wrong. Her dad had a Hillman at Poltesco and I remember it well and its registration number DBC 6. He always said the Danish Bacon company would be interested in the number.

It is interesting to compare with what is normal today. She had a parking fine of £2 when she left her car on the street too long. Mr Ironside returned to Leicester for an eye operation in 1953 for cataracts and he was in hospital for at least two weeks. I had cataracts sorted last year and it was just a day at the hospital.

Some things get better and some worse!

# Gardening in August and September

by David Endean

Many of your traditional herbaceous perennials may now be looking a bit tired especially as it has been so dry of late, so dead head them and trim them back where necessary.

One type of herbaceous plant which looks good from now until the autumn are Heleniums, they come in various shades of what I call autumn colours, which are yellows through burnt oranges to maroon. They also come in various sizes from short front of border interest to tall (4 feet or more) back of border fillers. I like them and a reasonable selection can be found locally but they do have one down side in that, although they like full sun, they prefer cool feet so a soil which dries out and bakes is not ideal unless you can give them more water. A plant with a similar colour scheme but which is less fussy about soil conditions is Rubeckia Fulgida, especially the variety Goldsturn. They can make quite good cut flowers and will brighten up the garden as the days shorten into autumn.

Part of Electrical Safety Register www.electricalsafetyregister.com As we move into September one plant that we cannot forget to mention is the Aster or Michaelmas Daisy. The colours are more tranquil but are certainly worth their place in the garden. Their forms also vary from tall frothy types to eight inch tall shocking pink cushions of flower. Asters can suffer from mildew so therefore I suggest you try the Nova Belgii types for their resistance to this.

Keep up the watering and dead heading of the summer annuals, these should be filling out now and covering the gaps left from your spring bulbs. When gaps do appear consider planting with some winter bedding like wallflowers, primroses or violas.

September is a good time to start planting your spring bulbs and even if you do not plant them now start to buy them early so you get the best firm bulbs from the

varieties that you really like. It may well seem like a long way off but you will need to plant now or in October to get flowers for the spring show in March.

But much closer is the Autumn Show and so I thought that I would tell you some of the tricks to get better blooms on your Dahlias for the show. Firstly do not let all your buds develop. Pinch out those flower buds either side of the main central bud, this will leave a single flower to develop, I then remove some of the side shoots down the main stem. At least the first pair of side shoots need to be removed and more on the larger flowered cultivars. The only type of Dahlia that this method can be problematical with are Pom Pom blooms which need to be less than 2 inches in diameter therefore leave them until much later before the show. This disbudding encourages larger better shaped blooms with more petals. This method also helps you to time your blooms for the show. Pom poms take 14 days for a bud the size of a large pea to develop into a show bloom, large blooms take 28 days and the giants take 36 or more days.

In the vegetable garden there is little to sow now but harvesting is well under way. There are still a few quick crops which you can sow, mainly quick maturing brassicas, things like garden turnips, pak choi and its oriental siblings, spring green cabbages, are a must for me again this year.

There is still time for some salads like radish and spring onions and also lettuce, at this time of year the loose leaved lettuce varieties are the best bet to grow. If you want just those tender baby leaves it really does not matter what type you sow therefore if you have part of a packet left over give it a go.

August is the time many gardeners' thoughts turn to Christmas and providing something fresh and special for the Christmas dinner. In the past I have grown new potatoes for the festive period and so now is the time to plant what are termed as second crop potato tubers. These are quick maturing varieties which have been cool stored for this purpose. For the best results plant them in large pots or bags in some good compost with plenty of fertiliser, then you can move them inside if the weather gets too bad.

Young finger type carrots are also worth a shot, sow a quick maturing type like Amsterdam Forcing or Early Nantes and keep well watered. One added benefit from sowing now is you are less likely to be troubled by carrot fly due to their lifecycle. These can be sown outside but even better is in a deep pot or tub in the greenhouse if you have the room they will take a little more care but you will have more success.

Well I reckon that I have waffled on long enough, so now it is down to you to enjoy your gardening.....

# Your opinions wanted: Dogs at Fishing beach, Cadgwith

At their meeting on 10<sup>th</sup> June 2019 the Parish Council considered an initial 'pre-consultation' request by Cornwall Council which asked if we thought the current arrangements for dog bans on beaches were suitable. We responded that the restrictions at Kennack Sands (first beach closest to car park) and Little beach, Cadgwith were fit for purpose and should not change (Easter-September, 7am-7pm). The Council also responded that the lack of restrictions at Kennack Sands (furthest beach from car park) was appropriate and should not change.

The Fishing beach at Cadgwith currently has no restrictions on the presence of dogs, and the Council considered this at length. It was felt that the current arrangement, where dogs are allowed 24-7 and where dog fouling can occur, is not acceptable from a food hygiene and environmental health point of view – given that it is a working port and fish are landed there. The Council did not agree, however, that an outright ban is necessarily the right approach, given that there are community events on the beach where locals will bring their dogs; and given the importance to the local tourist industry of having areas for dogs and dog owners to enjoy.

The full public consultation by Cornwall Council should be taking place in Summer/Autumn, and everyone will have a chance to respond to this (look out for this on the Cornwall Council website). The Parish Council will also be asked to make a formal response at this point and wishes to harness opinions from the community on the matter to help it formulate its position.

If you have an opinion on this, please discuss informally with any of our parish councillors who will be glad to hear your views, or if you wish to make to make a more formal representation please email or write to the Parish Clerk by 1<sup>st</sup> September 2019 explaining your position and reasons.
