





Grade–Ruan School

Are you interested in being a school governor?

Grade-Ruan Church of England School has recently become part of the Southerly Point Co-operative MAT, joining with 18 other local schools, including Mullion Secondary, Helston School, and all Lizard primaries.

The school shares an Exec Head, Mrs Louise Jones, with our nearest neighbour, Landewednack School, and has Jane Talbot as Deputy Head, based at Grade-Ruan full time. With an expanding number of pupils on roll (70), this is an exciting time for our village school.

As part of the re-organisation on joining the MAT, we are seeking new governors to build an expanded local governing body, to help shape and steer the school. Governors will receive training and support, so there is no need to have prior educational knowledge, just an enthusiasm to discover more. We are looking for community minded folk. A family link to the school isn't a pre-requisite, nor a church connection, but both could be a motivation for getting involved in this rewarding role.

Being a governor involves attending once or twice termly meetings, other training sessions, and making occasional monitoring visits in the school day. The role is voluntary, and subject to a DBS check and an application process.





Other finalists included a man who designed a dinghy for disabled sailors, a Signing counselling service for the deaf,



a cosmetic and health related skin blemish disguising service and a mum who blogs about being in her wheelchair.

We were invited to a grand award ceremony at the Royal Chelsea Hospital (home of the Chelsea Pensioners) where we received our giant cheques and the overall winner was announced. The winner was the MD of the deaf (signing) counselling service. She won £30,000.

We could not believe our ears when Sir Stelios told the 200+ audience that he actually wanted to invest in our business.

Exciting Times ahead

Helen and Steve have recently returned from visiting the HQ of the easyGroup in London where they were in the initial negotiations to become part of the easy family of brands.

They also were invited to attend an event where 10 start-up companies from around the world were invited to pitch to the audience for investment. Helen said "It was an interesting day to say the least". Helen and Steve are now back in Cadgwith and looking forward to the next steps in their exciting business venture.





Gardening in December and January



by David Endean

Well autumn disappeared in a flash. Unfortunately we moved from summer straight to winter. I have been in my wet gear for ages and the change of hat has happened so it is official. Winter will be long this year but that does not

mean that there is nothing to do in the garden, as much as you may wish to curl up and hibernate.

I have several jobs to do, many left over from the autumn as I am behind with the weather. I have three large beds of roses which need pruning, they are hybrid teas so that is an easy job apart from the thorns. Just cut out all the dead and weak stems, and cut back the remaining stems hard, leaving three buds from the base. It is drastic but satisfying. Then I'll give the whole bed a thick mulch. This could be well rotted manure, garden compost or leaf mould. In the early spring I will give it a dose of fertiliser.

I have several large buddleias that need pruning also. Another easy job as these can be cut back to within a foot of the ground with a saw and the top disposed of. The branches are quite brittle so the winter winds will often break and tear limbs off. Buddleias grow like mad and flower on that year's wood so those people that just play at pruning end up with a huge bush with the flowers out of reach to appreciate.

The mower will get one more outing over the lawns before Christmas, then give it a good clean down. It is a good opportunity then to get the mower serviced so that you are ready to start again next season. Often for me the next season starts again in January.

I have got several apple trees to prune. Large mature trees need little work other than the removal of dead and damaged branches. With young trees, aim to maintain an open structure and shorten those leading branches back so that you leave about three buds on this year's growth. I have a client with a particularly tree which has tasty apples. It is on a dwarfing root stock which is fine but the roots struggle to keep the trees upright so more staking is required. Because it is so tasty and we have no idea what variety it is, I am being actively encouraged to attempt to propagate it. Now is the ideal time to take some hardwood cuttings. I also plan to attempt some grafting. This is where you splice some of this apple onto another rootstock or tree. I have attempted this before without success, but nothing ventured nothing gained.

Now is the ideal time to take hardwood cuttings. This is the easiest way

to propagate shrubs although it takes a while. Prepare some ground, removing all the weeds. Maybe add a little grit to aid drainage, but there is no need to add any fertiliser. Then open up a slit trench which is done by pushing a spade in the ground and working it back and forth a few times. Then select your material to propagate: you want young healthy stems but woody about 8 inches long. Push these into the trench half way down, making sure the stems are the right way around, then firm them in well. You will have to keep an eye on them for twelve months, keeping them weed free. Hopefully next autumn they will have developed a good root system and put on some top growth; then you can move them to a permanent home. This is a good way of propagating roses, hedging plants like Grisselinia, hawthorn, maple, Weigelia and many more. If you only want a few plants and cannot dedicate an area for this 12 months, you can always use a large pot - the larger the better. Fill it with a good gritty compost and do as before. The disadvantage of this is that you will have to keep an eye on the watering a lot more.

Traditionally the shortest day is the time to plant your shallots and Boxing Day is the time to sow your large exhibition onions, January is taking chrysanthemum cuttings and later on in the month I will be sowing my sweet peas. So make the most of any nice days and get out there and enjoy your gardening.



LIZARD LIFEBOAT VISITOR CENTRE NEWS

The end of the year and the run in to Christmas has, historically, been a busy period for the lifeboats of the Lizard and, in evidence of this, some 34 vessels and 63 crew and passengers have been directly assisted during the November and December periods since the first of the Kilcobben Cove Stations was opened in 1961. In addition, the Lizard Lifeboat has been called out during these two months on a number of other occasions since 1961 to stand by vessels in the event of direct assistance being required.

Some notable 'shouts' have included attendance to the Auxiliary vessel 'NONSUCH' on 10th November 1968 and to the yacht 'MANCHESTER CHALLENGE 2003' on 23rd November 2003. On 16th December 1939, *RNLB DUKE OF YORK* was launched to assist the Glasgow coaster SS RUBAAN en route from Portreath to Charlestown loaded with ballast. She struck a rock half a mile off the Lizard and her crew of eight were rescued from her boat and taken to safety.

The most tragic and traumatic action during this period was, of course, to the loss of *RNLB SOLOMON BROWNE* with all hands on 19th December 1981; an event etched deep into the



souls of all RNLI personnel and, most especially, to everyone involved with the Penlee Lifeboat.


