If you are over 18 and live or work in the Parish of Grade Ruan, which includes Ruan Minor, Cadgwith, St Ruan and Kuggar, you could be eligible to become a Parish Councillor. The Council are looking to fill two Parish Council vacancies.

Full Council meetings are normally on the evening of the second Wednesday of the month, and occasional additional committee meetings occur on an ad hoc basis. You should be able to commit to attend most of the Full Council meetings, and have an interest in the local community. You do not need any prior experience of local government or politics. For an informal chat about the vacancy and what the role entails, please contact Lee Dunkley, the Parish Clerk. Alternatively, if you know an existing Councillor, please do talk with them about the opportunity. You can also find out more information about the Council on our website.

Should you wish to be considered for the role, please write a statement (maximum 300 words) detailing who you are and why you would like to join the Council. This must be received by email to the Clerk by 1 May 2023 (contact details at the top of the poster). You will then be asked to attend the Council meeting on 10th May 2023.

We collected two full bags of rubbish which included fishing ties/wire, cans, bottles and even one wet suit shoe. The most disappointing thing was the amount of dog mess again that had to be picked up by our volunteers - not a pleasant task. Some of it was in with the ponies!

Dog fouling is not only unpleasant it contains worms and parasites that can cause serious diseases in sheep, cattle, horses and humans. Most dog owners are caring and responsible but sadly, as the evidence from this beach clean shows there are still people who do not clean up after their dogs. Owners failing to clean up after their dog do face fines up to £100, and if it goes to court this could cost the owner up to £1000! The law states that being unaware a dog has fouled or not having a suitable bag is not a reasonable excuse. So please keep Kennack Sands a dog mess free zone!

The Lizard RNLI Lifeboat Station



Louise Minchin (pictured left), has teamed up with the RNLI to give us her top tips for cold water swimming. The former BBC Breakfast presenter is a keen open water swimmer and often goes for a dip at the coast. But even though she's a confident swimmer, Louise knows that anyone can get into trouble in the water. Sea temperatures around the UK and Ireland will average just 6 to 10 degrees around March. Cold water shock is a real danger for anyone entering water that is 15 degrees or below.

Follow these top tips to ensure you have an enjoyable and safe time:

- 1. Wear a brightly coloured swim cap and consider using a tow float.
- 2. Never swim alone, always go with a friend if possible. Tell someone when you plan to be back.
- 3. Acclimatise slowly, never jump straight in, as this can lead to cold water shock.
- 4. If you get into trouble, FLOAT TO LIVE. Lean back in the water and extend your arms and legs.

If you're in any doubt, stay out of the water, and always take a means of calling for help with you. If you or anyone else gets into trouble at the coast, call 999 or 112 and ask for the Coastguard.



Rector's Ramblings

fter three years of painstaking work, Leonardo da Vinci completed his vision of the Last Supper and showed the completed painting to a trusted friend. "Give me your honest opinion," said da Vinci. "It's wonderful" said his friend. "In fact, that cup is so real I can't keep my eyes off it." Immediately, da Vinci took a brush and painted out the glow on the sparkling cup. The friend looked puzzled and asked, "Why have you done that? The cup was beautiful." The great artist replied, "Because it's distracting you from looking at Jesus".

Easter draws us to look at Jesus afresh. Jesus' love, goodness, generosity and life continually say something to us. His rising from the dead on that first Easter Sunday was, and continues to be, a bold declaration of the triumph of love over hatred, good over evil, generosity over meanness, life over death.

Where hatred divides us one from another, Jesus says come and see a different way.

Where evil brings murder to our own streets or, elsewhere in the world, maims innocent Ukrainians and persecutes worshipping Christians in many parts of the world, Jesus says: "Human life is precious." Where meanness fills thoughts about refugees, Jesus says: "Welcome the stranger." Where death holds us captive to a past long gone, Jesus says: "I have come to give you life and life in abundance."

So when we witness the love and future hopes of others being crushed, when we hear of cries of joy being changed to cries of anguish, when we see images of bodies torn apart by ruthless bombing and when we try to grasp something of the daunting catalogue of human need world-wide, we must not only be outraged, we must also be driven to try and be part of the answer to prayers made for that better way of living to become a realty — a way of living which comes only through a belief in the risen Lord Jesus.

Alleluia. Christ is risen! He is risen indeed. Alleluia!

From the Gazette Archive 30 Years Ago - April 1993

Grade Ruan VC School - Appeal for Our Bell Ask not for whom the bell tolls: alas at present no-one!

On Monday 15th March the school bell was removed by the builders from its prominent position, and will not be heard again until it has been renovated. We have researched the records at County Hall but can find no reference to the school bell, so assume that it was erected when the school was built in 1859. Since those days it has rung out for children at the beginning and end of school and play times, but now it's showing its age.

An inspection has shown extensive corrosion. The governors and staff agreed that this historic part of Grade-Ruan School should be repaired - the estimated cost is £600.

An account has been opened to meet the costs. We would be very pleased if everyone who has been summoned by the bell or has enjoyed its tone - and been delighted that electronic wonders have not taken over - would help towards the cost.



THE LIZARD LIFEBOAT VISITOR CENTRE NEWS

MOTOR TANKER 'D. L. HARPER'

Built in Hamburg, Germany and launched in December 1932, the motor tanker 'D. L. Harper' was a large vessel of some 12,350 tons. On 20th June, 1935, she was on passage from Aruba, in the Durch West Indies, to Hamburg, fully loaded with a cargo of crude oil, five passengers and thirty-eight crew.

Weather conditions were difficult with poor visibility through fog and intermittent heavy rain, a strong southerly breeze and heavy ground seas. As the D. L. Harper passed Lizard Point, she struck the Crane Rocks at Caerthillion Cove and ran aground at approximately 6pm. Information on the incident was received through the coastguard and Lloyd's signal station and the Watson Class, Lizard lifeboat, 'RNLB DUKE OF YORK' was launched. The lifeboat reached the stricken tanker within ten minutes and was able to take off the five passengers (including a mother and her baby) and land them safely just after 7pm. The Duke of York re-launched some 30 minutes later, returned to the 'D. L. Harper' and, in difficult conditions, stood by the vessel all night.

The following morning the crew decided to leave the stranded vessel and the lifeboat was able to take all thirty-eight of them on board and deliver them to the safety of the Polpeor shore at approximately 8am. In the rough overnight conditions, a leak had developed in one of the tanker's holds and crude oil had escaped into the sea. This leakage had the calming effect of damping the surge of the waves and was an enormous help in the lifeboat being able

to evacuate the crew. The D. L. Harper's captain was extremely grateful for the help given by the coxswain and crew of the Duke of York and said, "I cannot speak too highly of your coxswain and crew. They are a splendid lot".

Efforts to refloat the tanker were successful and she was able to reach Falmouth on the 24th June for attention and repairs.

As many of you will already know, my fishing boat Crig-a-Tana sunk seven miles off the Lizard on November 12th 2022. Luckily Callum and I made it to the life raft and were rescued by our fellow volunteers on the Lizard Lifeboat.

I'd like to say a huge thank you to the people who were involved that day; from fishermen aiding the search and rescue operation to the RNLI and those who offered their support, I'm eternally grateful. I've been overwhelmed by the kindness of people from the village and further afield, whether it be a kind word spoken, a hug or an offer of help or advice to get me on my feet.

Exactly two months to the day of the incident, I managed to find a suitable boat in Cardigan Bay and shook hands with an Irish Welshman to agree the sale. After a few weeks sourcing transportation, Santa Fe arrived in Gweek Boatyard where she remained for a little over five weeks whilst I carried out a refit.

Once the work was completed and the MCA inspection passed, it was time to bring her back to the cove, which coincidently happened to be on St Piran's Day. The trip from Gweek was flat clam, not a breath of wind and we made it to the cove faster anticipated, a welcome change from Crig-A-Tana who rarely made it over five knots!

We were thrilled to see a welcome party gathered on the beach to see us in and celebrate Santa Fe's arrival to the Cadgwith fishing fleet. Photos were taken, beers were drunk and yarns were told before heading to the pub where songs were sang and more beers enjoyed.



Gardening in April

by David Endean

Well hopefully spring is truly here now, March has had it all, wind, rain, a bit of frost and some sunshine. We just about got away without the snow but it was not far away.

The time is here to get in around your beds and borders and remove any weeds that have lurked there all winter, plus those annual weeds are now just germinating so whip them out before they are a problem. If you can, use a border fork to gently work the soil between your plants, do not dig too deeply just the top inch or two otherwise you are likely to damage the roots of your precious plants. This helps get some air into the soil which is essential for good root growth, it will help to stop the growth of mosses, liverworts and the like and it will make it easier to hoe later in the season. Then sprinkle some general fertiliser around your plants they will need it, the winter will have washed much out and all the plants will soon be putting on a lot of growth and will need the nutrients to do so.

Check all your climbers after the winter and tie them back in if they need it and prune of any dead bits, give them a feed as well, you will see a theme coming here.

I have mown the lawns 2 or three times so far this season and have noticed a lot of moss in them. If this bothers you now is the time to treat the lawn and then use a rake to remove the moss. It is likely that the moss got a hold after that dry summer last year which left some open patches. Also lawns need a feed so the grass can remain healthy and out compete the weeds and moss. We keep cutting it each week removing all the growth but how many of us put anything back to replace the nutrients that we have taken away.

In the veg garden there is much on the go, I have some broad bean to plant out which I grew on in pots from a sowing last month, I may well still have my onion sets to plant out as they have not been planted as I write this. But the first outdoor sowings of many vegetables can take place now, carrots, parsnips, salad leaves, cabbages, radish, beetroot and the list goes on. I do not bother with potatoes as they take up so much space for their value, but you may have already planted your earlies, now is not too late and maincrop varieties can go in now. Prepare the ground well, dig deep and add liberal amounts of well-rotted organic matter and fertiliser. Give plenty of space between the rows to allow you to draw the soil up around the haulms to form ridges. Doing this protects the developing tubers from the light so they do not go green plus it has the bonus of knocking the weeds off.

I expect many of you will be getting your tomato plants to plant in the greenhouse this month. Keep an eye on the weather as you will need to make sure the greenhouse gets plenty of ventilation when the sun is out as it is getting strong now and the temperatures will fly up inside and burn your plants. Equally we can get some very cold nights and your plants may need some protection from a frost so be prepared to put some horticultural fleece over them by night. Invariably a cold night will follow a glorious spring day.

As your spring shrubs finish flowering you can prune them if they need it. It often helps to rejuvenate many shrubs if you remove just a few of the oldest branches each year. Typical shrubs are forsythia and flowering currants. You can also prune camellias and rhododendrons now after they flowered but I would only do so to improve shape not as a matter of course.

Well I hope that gives you a few ideas I am off to plant out my Sweetpeas, enjoy your gardening.


